Nila Cleaning The context NSS Training College, Ottapalam is always about the social issues and needs of the society. The institution actively participated

in many social activities in its local surroundings. River Nila or Bharathapuzha is three kilometers away from the college and is a major source of water for surrounding towns. But the river is reducing to a narrow stream and it has been polluted by non degradable and other waste materials.

Face book group for Alumni Students Objectives: • To familiarize with web 2.0 technologies • To provide a platform for active learning, critical thinking, co-operative study, self expression and a communicative environment. • To collect phone numbers and email ids of all students and teachers and add them to academic WhatsApp groups as well as FB pages. • Upload photos and other materials in WhatsApp group and college site as well (date wise) • To attain a dynamic structure and increased interaction by means of web 2.0 technology. • The actual class room environment is brought to the learner at home (at any time) through video blogging. • To enable students and teachers to load various materials to the web 2.0 groups. • Maintaining relationship with alumni members and other college teachers. • Includes inputs as texts, photographs, videos or sounds • Enable student to load various materials to their blogs. • Enable students to express their

opinions, learns cooperatively, reflect, create portfolio, think critically develop their writing skill • To participate actively and develop social skills

Video lessons are recorded and it is being uploaded to you tube and the audio lesson are uploaded through audio by the teachers. This helpful for sharing resources effectively. The actual classroom environment is brought to learners at home through video lesions. NSS Training College has a blog of its own. The day to day activities of the college can be viewed and read in the blog. Teachers used to upload the learning materials of their relevant topics which can be easily accessed in this platform. The links of certain sites enriches the learning experience of the students as the notes learning materials of other teachers are also made available in the blog. The college also provides workshops for the students in which resource persons make students acquainted with the use of blogs and help students to create their own blog. Even though the college blog was started two years back, it started with full-fledged functioning in this year. The administrator as the one controls the activities in the blog. N.S.S. Training College has a Face book group of its own. Any group member can upload images, videos etc. in group which can be easily accessed by other members. The day-to-day activities of the college can be viewed and read in their platform.
